2024 has seen consistently solid attendance. Family services instruct and amuse. The music program brings passion and energy not only to our services but continues to expand by scheduling programs open to the public. Fred (and others as needed) provide inspirational and thoughtful services.

Our "apron wearing" efforts, The Dinner Table and Tabitha's Closet, among others, have thrived. The Green Team has continued to bring environmental justice to the forefront with presentations on nuclear energy and being a "Climate Church". Our care and comforting ministries uplift many through our prayer circle and prayer shawls.

Our finances are holding their own in a somewhat uncertain environment due to the diligence of many, including a wise finance committee. Of particular note is the decision to pay off our mortgage and reduce our annual expenses.

We have also begun to plan for the future through a facility review process that will set the stage for a capital campaign in 2025. The review will also position us to anticipate and budget for capital needs for a decade.

I have been honored to serve as the PDCC President/Moderator for the past three years. There are dozens of congregants who make the church function; it is not possible to thank them all, but I would be especially remiss if I didn't thank Joanne Hayes for her tremendous work behind the scenes; and also my thanks to MaryLou McMillan who does so much for so many that I don't know that any of us truly know how good she is.

It has been a pleasure to serve this congregation in God's name.

Vitality and vibrancy! The level of participation, the number of activities and events, the community engagement – these kinds of things speak to the vitality and vibrancy of our faith family! It's pretty clear that our family of God continues to don aprons – following Christ's example and ethic of neighbor love. A vivid illustration is The Dinner Table Ministry that continues to thrive and with the addition of The Bistro, there are even more opportunities for people to be fed through PDCC's kitchen (and more opportunities for people to don their aprons).

The reports found within this document remind us that "be[ing] the church" as we like to say in the UCC, is a team effort where we are actively living our faith and hopefully living into our mission statement of being "Called by Christ to create shalom and justice for all."

Speaking of donning the apron and creating shalom and justice, Tabitha's Closet is another example of such efforts. Talk about Christ's compassionate love made visible! Thank you to all who are making this happen on a regular basis!

Our Green Team is an exemplification of both carrying out and living into our mission, in terms of striving to advocate for environmental stewardship, and, ultimately, the wholeness of God's good creation. I invite you to read their report. The ways they have provided (and continue to provide) educational offerings, even welcoming public discourse along the way, seem indicative of their desire to make a difference - not just within our faith family but also beyond. Which brings me to the progress they have made in terms of advocating for a new Green Amendment to the state constitution. Their work in this regard is remarkable and once again reveals a depth of commitment to the faithful stewardship of God's creation. One could say such efforts of this ministry team are becoming/have become a beacon in our state.

In terms of building fellowship, one way we approach(ed) this is through the Dine with Nine program/ministry, which continues to offer table fellowship. These special meal events can help foster the connection between the members of Christ's Body. Thank you to those who hosted these important dinners during 2024! The Having It My Way series was a significant program offered not only to our faith family but the wider community was invited as well. Thank you to the organizers and those who made this series possible. (You can read about such events, and more, in the Church Family Life report).

A unique Worship service happened in April. Working with the Scottish-American Society of Rhode Island, we held a family blessing – Kirkin' o' the Tartan Service – at our church. We celebrated it as part of a Sunday worship service in April. This even included bagpipes and turned out to be a special day at PDCC. It's noteworthy how, through a willingness to serve the wider community (especially through an event like this), we can find ourselves blessed in the process!

And once again the "Tunes and Tacos" event was held at our church, in support of fine arts students in South Kingstown. I welcomed folks to the event, at the beginning, and am so glad that we are able to welcome and support our community (especially the students), in such significant ways.

In terms of community service, that's not all! The Pumpkins with a Purpose continues to be an impactful way we are engaging our community in support of people experiencing homelessness and the Native Americans who grew the pumpkins. Thank God for all of you who helped make this happen!

And of course there is the playground project, headed up by our own Claudia Swain, to build a brand-new playground at Fournier Estates. Congratulations! Thank you to all who helped make this expression of neighbor love possible. This "list" of community service is not all-inclusive, but our identity as a community-oriented church (who serves the community), is impressive!

Our innovative approach to worship is an example of our extravagant welcome. And it's not just about offering a variety. Take, for instance, the Family Worship Service. First of all, let me say, it is a blessing to work with Meg Kolodziej, particularly on things like the family worship services, as we attract/welcome families with children to these unique intergenerational worship experiences designed especially with young people in mind. I invite you to read Claudia Swain's report to learn more about our Christian Education ministry. Nathaniel Baker's musical prowess and choir-directing gifts are continued blessings. And MaryLou's administrative skills are a cut above. Mary DePietro, our sexton, continues to make her contributions both with regard to helping us prepare for (and recover from) special events facilities-wise, and in other ways as well (including baking!), and we thank her for her service.

I have not mentioned all the ministries of our church in this report, but it is clear that God's Spirit continues to move in creative and compassionate ways at PDCC. Ultimately, our team approach to ministry is serving us, and our community, well. Christ's light is shining at Peace Dale Congregational Church!

It is my privilege to serve you in the role of Sr. Minister. Thank you, siblings in Christ, for doing your part, for donning the apron here at PDCC, and for helping us share God's love, as we strive to create shalom

167th ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION FEBRUARY 11, 2024

Call to Order

Peter Swain called the meeting to order at 11:30 am after all shared a delicious pot-luck brunch.

Opening Prayer

Moderator Peter Swain delivered an opening prayer.

Verification of a forum

Clerk Joanne Haynes verified that a quorum was present (over 34 members).

Approval of Minutes

Minutes of the February 2023 Annual Meeting were emailed to all members as part of the 2023 Annual Report. Clerk Joanne Haynes asked for any additions or corrections. There were none. John Golberg moved that the minutes be approved as presented. Second by Claudia Swain. Voted/Passed.

Minutes of the September Special Congregational meeting were also emailed to members. Receiving no additions or corrections, there was a motion by Sylvia Blanda to approve the minutes as presented and seconded by Betsy Nelson. Voted/Passed.

Remembering the Saints

The following names of members and non-members who have died in the past year were lifted up by Pastor Fred Evenson and a bell rung by Lee Jeans: Barry Keinard, Bruce Reynolds, Margorie Sill, Carolyn Traxler, Carl Amaral, Julie Ann Fuller, John Hefler, Eileen Lyons, Keith Tucker, Nicholas Vlachos, and Hazel White.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Fred commented that this was re-setting year for the church. There were significant by-law changes implemented and worship services were revamped. Fred was finally installed as our pastor! All were encouraged to read the full report in the Annual Report. Fred highlighted the formation of Tabitha's Closet, 3 new member classes, and the feeding of the hungry both physically and spiritually. Dine with Nine was lifted up as a significant way to build fellowship. Fred thanked Peter for his leadership and the whole congregation for donning aprons to carry out the mission of our church.

Moderator's Report

Peter shared that the changes experienced this past year reflected the congregational spirit of our church. He thanked those who spearheaded the by-law changes and the changes to the worship formats. It feels like we have returned to normal following the disruption of Covid. Fred has found his groove among us as he has been very busy and active both internally and in the community. Thank you Fred.

Peter thanked Joanne Haynes, Darlene Hermes and Claudia Swain (his wife) for their support of him during this past year.

Approval of 2024 6-month Budget

Due to changes in the by-laws, the budget year will now be July 1 through June 30th. To put us in sync with that change, a six-month budget was created and is being presented for congregational approval. The fiscal year budget will be presented at another congregational meeting in May 2024.

The six-month budget was presented by Treasurer Jim Blackerby. Jim described the money in the church as representing a living organism that then gives back. He asked people to refer to the full treasurer's report published in the Annual Report. Jim thanked Carol Vetter and Gary Bower for their work on the Finance committee and support of the financial processes and John Hobgood for his leadership of Property Management. With our aging building and many repairs needed for the parsonage, Jim suggested that it is likely time for a Capital Campaign to provide the funds needed for these expenses.

Jim presented the 6-month budget that was included in the Annual Report and in copies on the tables. It includes a reduction of 50% in the amount we are budgeting for support of national and conference UCC. There is a projected deficit of \$4,483.53. A motion to accept the budget was made by Wally Young and Seconded by Mary Roda.

Questions and comments covered the lack of funds for a sabbatical, the need for more people to make financial commitments, and how major maintenance expenses will be handled. Expenses not covered in the budget will be brought to the Executive Board and approved as needed using funds from the Maintenance Reserve and possibly Memorial Funds. Additional comments covered the immediate need to address repairs and upgrades needed for the Parsonage. Don Hermes reminded us that our investment in solar panels is saving us \$12-14,000 yearly in electricity expenses.

The motion was voted and passed.

Election of Officers, Boards and Delegates

Val Lowell made a motion that the slate of officers, Boards and Delegates be accepted as presented. Seconded by Darlene Hermes. Voted/Passed.

Name Tags

Sylvia Blanda said that in order for us to be a welcoming community, especially with increasing numbers of new people among us, names tags are needed. She explained the process for creating names tags as needed, collecting them at the end of worship services and where to find them in subsequent Sundays. Ushers will now be engaged to be greeters before the services in the narthex in addition to responsibilities during the worship services.

Closing Prayer

Pastor Fred offered a closing prayer.

SPECIAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING OF PEACE DALE CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH April 15, 2024

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by President Peter Swain at 11:05 am. He declared that at quorum is present.

Opening prayer

Pastor Fred Evenson led us in an opening prayer.

Quorum Established

Clerk Joanne Haynes declared that a quorum was present.

Meeting purpose and motions

The purpose of this meeting is to approve an expenditure of up to \$25,000 for conducting engineering studies of the church building and grounds to identify need for and cost for short-term and longer-term maintenance. This information is the precursor to establishing a Capital Campaign to fund the repairs and improvements. According to the by-laws, this amount of unbudgeted expense requires congregational approval.

John Hobgood presented information about the two companies recommended and provided some detail of what they would do. A 10-year plan will be provided.

The analysis does not include evaluation of the parsonage. Conversation has been initiated with Habitat for Humanity to build a new parsonage and one additional house on existing land.

The Executive Board has allocated half (about \$18,000) of a gift from the estate of Bruce Reynolds to start a Capital Campaign. The other half is recommended to the Music Board as a Music Memorial. It was suggested that that money might be earmarked for organ repair and maintenance.

A motion was made by Jim Blackerby and seconded by Lee Jeans to spend up to \$25,000 for engineering studies of the church building and grounds to help identify most critical needs for a Capital Campaign.

After much discussion, the motion passed.

Peter offered thanks to Tom Heald, Michael Garr and John Hobgood for their work to identify the companies to conduct the engineering studies needed.

Adjournment

SPECIAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING OF PEACE DALE CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH June 23, 2024

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by President Peter Swain at 10:58 am.

Quorum Established

Clerk Joanne Havnes declared that a quorum was present.

Meeting purpose and motions

The purpose of the meeting was to approve a fiscal year 2024-2025 budget, pay-off of the mortgage and approval of expenditure to provide air-conditioning for the parsonage.

1. Eve Keenan moved that the congregation approve that the mortgage of approximately \$60,000 be paid off by taking such funds from the Endowment. Second by Linda Tucker. Voted/Passed.

- a. The interest rate on the mortgage is now 5.5% and could adjust higher if interest rates increase.
- b. The Finance Committee recommended this to the Executive Board based on the significant increase in the Endowment investments and what appears to be a good time to sell some stock holdings.
- c. This will save approximately \$13,000 in annual expenses in the budget
- d. Over the long term it could reduce the annual amount allowed to be taken from the Endowment by \$3,600 due to the reduced asset amount.

2. Tom Heald moved that the balanced budget of \$459,074 be approved for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. Second by Jean Simpson. Voted/Passed

Following are the significant areas that impact that balanced budget:

- a. Current contributions are estimated to be \$266,700. This is hopefully a conservative estimate that is about \$8,000 less than the total amount received for calendar year 2023.
- b. Income from the Endowment will be \$70,000. That is \$9,000 more than the amount taken in 2023. This is a result of the increase in the Endowment value. A three-year rolling average of the value on March 31 was used to create an amount that accounted for market fluctuations. This calculation will be used each year for developing the income for the budget.
- c. A 3.5% increase is provided for all employees.
- d. Payment to the UCC conference was reduced by about 50% to \$8,800 but still within conference guidelines.
- e. Guest musicians amount was increased to \$11,000 from an expense of \$6,500 in 2023.
- f. A new item of Child Care was established at an estimated amount of \$1,700. It is hoped this will help to attract younger families.
- g. There would be no mortgage expense, based on passing #1 above, saving \$13,000 annually.
- h. There is only \$1,000 needed to be budgeted for electricity. This is a savings of about \$14,000 (not including current rate increases) due to the installation of the solar panels.
- i. Cleaning services will cost about \$5,500 less due to a more specific scope established in a new contract.
- j. General maintenance is expected to cost about \$12,000 to meet necessary short-term needs. This was approximately the amount spent in 2023.
- k. A new item of \$1,500 is provided to help pay for delegates to represent PDCC at the UCC regional conference.

3. John Golberg moved to approve up to \$18,000 for installing split heating/cooling units in the Parsonage. The funds should be taken from the General Memorial Fund. Second Marlene Williams. Voted/Passed

- a. This is recommended as necessary and among work that is being done on the Parsonage to bring it up to current living standards.
- b. In the long term, these units can be reinstalled into a new parsonage should that future project be approved.
- c. The General Memorial Fund had an undesignated balance of \$56,600 as of May 31, 2024.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 11:06 pm.

MSV to approve the Security and use of Audio-Visual equipment policy as presented.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Christian Education team has been blessed with outstanding leadership by our own Meg Kolodziej, and her trusty partners: Tom Kolodziej and Ed Holt. Due mostly to Meg's efforts with Rev. Fred and Nathanial Baker, we have had a strong response to our monthly Family Services. The Christian Ed Committee and our teachers have strengthened our Youth Connect and Youth Group activities and supported other efforts in the wider church.

Youth Connect: We are fortunate to have put the talents of our church members to work, on stage and back stage, to bring our faith forward during the year. Susan Sward along with Olivia and Morgan Weinrich designed the Creation banners that were dramatically revealed at the September Family Service and the 11-foot whale that saved Jonah in October. In November, Guy Cassaday, Dave Worthen and Kathleen Royles helped us part the Red Sea.

Robert LaMunyon, Dave Worthen, Susan Sward, Patti Gross, Scott San Antonio, and Aleda Skeffington and Rev. Fred, James McMonigle and Peter Swain, supported by musicians and our <u>Once-a-Month</u> Singers, added to the fun and family friendly nature of the services.

- Easter Services: Easter was celebrated with two well-attended services, at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m., where baptisms were also planned for each service.

- Kirking of the Tartan Ceremony: On April 7th, we held the Kirking of the Tartan ceremony, which
 included a blessing of the Women's Fellowship kits. Special thanks to Barbara Gilbert for helping
 to organize this event.
- Earth Day Service: On Earth Day, we held a service that featured an informative and inspirational dialogue between Don Hermes and Claudia Swain from the Green Team.

Fred enjoyed summer vacation time in July, during which guest ministers Rev. Scott Spencer and Rev. Kent Rhodehamel filled in, focusing themes on hospitality and fellowship. In August, Rev. Other special events and ministries throughout the year included:

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Below are highlights for the Board of Missions as it continued to serve the greater Peace Dale/Wakefield community this year as well as global missions:

In October, Tabitha's Closet celebrated its first anniversary. It was a great first year. The Closet operates each Saturday from 9:30 – 12:30. Thanks to the donations of clothing from the congregation and others, Tabitha's has been able to provide low cost and some free garments of excellent quality to the community. Many clients have expressed appreciation for PDCC and this mission. Local agencies continue to refer their clients to Tabitha's. We will continue in our attempts to reach all the people in the community who may benefit from Tabitha's. At the end of each quarter the donations made to the closet are redistributed to other missions. This year, the Dinner Table, Pastor's discretionary fund, the Gratitude Tree, CWS kits, and the Tuesday Bistro received distributions to help them in their service to the local and distant community. Many thanks to all the volunteers from within and without the congregation that allow the shop to operate.

The Dinner Table continued its great work and, in conjunction with St. Vincent de Paul, distributes over 400 meals each week with distribution occurring each Wednesday and Friday. See the Dinner Table report for more information.

The church supported the local Pride parade again by having an exhibitor table/booth on Main Street with pronoun pins and information on PDCC being open and affirming.

"The Pumpkin Patch had another rewarding October. By selling over 5,500 pumpkins, the church was able to give \$16,727 to the Welcome House from both sales and donations. This effort led by Wally Young also benefits the pumpkin fundraising company and native American growers in New Mexico who received over \$21,000. "Our success in selling all pumpkins is due in a major part to the South Kingstown High School Students and community members who support us with unloading and sales. It is such a pleasure, at the pumpkin patch, to hear all the kind and wonderful comments about the generosity and importance of Peace Dale Congregational Church in South Kingstown."

The Gratitude Tree mission once again was well supported by the congregation and provided gifts of toys, clothing, art supplies, sports equipment, gift cards and hygiene items to the local area. This year a portion of the proceeds from Tabitha's Closet increased the number of gifts that were able to be donated. These items are distributed to the community through the Jonnycake Center for Hope.

The Green Team was extremely active hosting events on environmental issues and working hard on several other significant initiatives including the Green Amendment and a Green Church designation for our church. See the separate Green Team report for more information.

Missions of the Month included Doctors Without Borders, Johnnycake Center for Hope, Egg A Day (Haiti), Save the Bay, Habitat for Humanity, Camp Lilac, Galilee Mission, Neighbors Helping Neighbors, VOAD – (UCC) Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster, Worcester Congregation supporting LGBTQ Refugees, UCC Helene Relief Fund, Tabitha's Closet, and The Peace Dale Dinner Table. On Christmas Eve, we

collected for the UCC Christmas/Veterans of the Cross Fund. In total, the Missions of the Month received a very generous total of \$29,413.77. Also received for additional mission projects was \$66,511.91 (including Playground, ALS, Tabitha's Closet, and various gifts and grants). The Board of Missions thanks the congregation for their strong support of our work.

For 2025 the committee will continue to look for new opportunities to serve both the local community and the global community.

In the fall, our Moller pipe organ was tuned/serviced and our three-octave set of Schulmerich handbells was refurbished. Our Ritmulleer grand piano was tuned/maintained once in both the spring and the fall as was the piano in the Music Room.

The primary goals of the Board of Music for 2024 included:

- Clarify the role of choirs in participating in worship services.
- Strategically grow membership of each choir, new members are always welcome.
 - O Going forward both the Traditional and the Contemporary choirs need to add new members. It does call for a commitment to a weeknight rehearsal. There is important "corporate memory" held and shared among the board members helping to provide continuity of efforts as membership evolves each year. It is important to strive for financially optimal solutions to these challenges which will be economical in the long term and consistent with PDCC philosophies regarding equity and environmental impact (i.e., "green").

Key Personnel: John Hobgood – Co-Chair, Byron Fish, Tom Heald, Ira Hare; active support has also come from Lee Jeans, Joe Fink and Jim Thomson; unfortunately, Mike Garr was unable to continue due to illness, and Joe Fink moved out of the area in late 2024.

Routine actions performed: Sunday church openings and closings, clock setting and winding, thermostat batteries, f/u with fire extinguisher vendor and date checks, monitor solar array performance (due to warranted repairs and favorable weather the array produced 65 MWh in 2024, up 14% from 57 MWh in 2023).

Special projects in progress: Building and systems assessment: Contracted with RIMKUS C3 and BCA; site surveys in November and December, pre-report conference held and report in progress for delivery in early 2025, to include 10-year maintenance projection. Repair aging fluorescent lighting in basement, stair well and storage rooms by conversion of fixtures to accommodate LED lighting (awaiting quote from Jedi Electric). Faucets in Men's room and associated shut off valves replaced by Tuckertown Plumbing in January of 2025.

Future directions, opportunities, and challenges: In CY-2025 Property Management will need to address the above projects in progress as well as addressing climate control for the space being used for Tabitha's Closet.

In addition, once the engineering study is received, Property Management will need to coordinate with the Executive Board and the Stewardship Board to develop goals for a capital campaign to support regular maintenance of major capital assets beyond 2025.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

The 2024 Board of Stewardship consisted of veteran members of the Board: John Golberg, Maria Cassaday, Mark Zedella. They were joined by George (Herk) Herchenroether, James Moore and Sylvia Blanda. We hope that all who are giving so generously to Peace Dale Congregational Church have experienced the transformational joy of giving to show Christ's love here on earth.

The Stewardship Board goals were:

Make the missional work of the church the focus of the stewardship drive. A Stewardship Campaign was conducted in October and November with the theme of "Giving with Gratitude". This campaign focused on how our giving of time, talent, and treasure allows Peace Dale Congregational Church to minister to our community as well as our congregants. Part of our goal was to foster the concept that without PDCC's structures, both physical and organizational, the good work of our ministries would not be possible. Pastor Fred provided a series of reflections and George Herchenroether organized representatives from organizations who benefit from our mission work to provide testimonials. Messages in E-light also enhanced the message of our campaign and there were three mailings to congregants. Thank you to all who responded with estimates of giving for 2025. There were 89 giving units for a total of \$233,548.24.

Increasing the number of givers and the amount pledged. A focus of the campaign was to increase the number of folks willing to commit financially to PDCC. Therefore, the Board instituted a step-up campaign which showed the spread of those giving and encouraged givers to step up to the next level for 2025. The Stewardship Board is thrilled to announce that the number of givers increased 22% from 73 to 89; overall giving increased by 19% from \$196,772 to \$233,548.24. Of the 73 givers in 2024, 25% of them stepped up for 2025 and many others moved up within their "step". This is an amazing show of generosity and willingness on the part of PDCC to create Shalom and justice for all.

Providing alternate ways to give. The various ways to give instituted by prior Stewardship Boards continue. We have on-line giving through Vanco and Pay Pal. Ways to give are highlighted in every worship service through a slide listing those options. The PDCC website also contains updated

information about electronic giving. The pew card that provides instructions for giving on-line includes a QR code that takes people directly to PDCC website "Ways to Give". There visitors can use the Vanco account to give as a guest without setting up a permanent account. The pew cards also provide something to put in the offering plate on Sunday morning for those who give electronically to visually show their support.

Lifting up those who make faith commitments. A cake and special hospitality was held on November 17th celebrating the end of our Stewardship drive and thanking those who pledged. The luminaria with the names of those who pledged lighted the way on Christmas Eve. A postcard was sent to those who pledged in 2024 to let them know that the luminaria would include their name and to thank them for their support.

FINANCE COMMITTEE AND TREASURER

The Finance Committee's function is to provide oversight on the church finances, including cash flow and investment management. This includes periodic review, addressing significant financial issues, and providing advice and recommendations to the Executive Board. Following is summary information regarding the income and expense for 2024, the first six-months of the annual fiscal year budget approved by the Executive Board, and the Restricted and Unrestricted Endowment position. Detailed financial statements are included beginning on page 26 of this Annual Report.

Income and Expenses for 2024

- 1. Total income was \$406,716 (\$4,904 greater than 2023). The primary revenue sources were \$266,480 from Current Contributions (\$8,247 less than 2023), \$69,489 from the UCC Trust Endowment (\$8,442 greater than 2023), \$17,194 from the Fobes Trust, \$10,421 from the Bazaar, and \$6,535 from RaiseRight (SCRIP).
- 2. Total expense was \$396,406 (\$8,971 greater than 2023). The primary expense areas were \$236,820 for Salaries and Benefits, \$66,276 for Property Management, \$38,234 for Insurance, \$19,674 for Office Expense, and \$11,233 for Music.
- 3. There were major capital and maintenance expenses for which the Executive Board voted to use monies from Reserve Funds. Music expenses of \$5,207 (bells and organ refurbishment) were paid from the Bruce Reynolds Music Fund (\$14,125 remaining balance) and a Property Management expense of \$12,972 (fire suppression system) was taken from the Maintenance Reserve Fund (\$7,108 remaining balance).
- 4. These adjustments result in a year-end surplus of about \$10,300. This will be figured into the current and future fiscal year budgets which will be addressed in June.
- 5. Two important impacts on the income and expense were paying off the mortgage and installation of solar panels. At the last Annual meeting in February 2023 the congregation voted to pay off the mortgage by taking funds from the Endowment. The mortgage was approximately \$63,000. This helped to save an annual mortgage cost of about \$12,500. The solar panel installation was completed in 2022 and by 2024 had the full impact of no electricity cost. The result is an annual savings of about \$14,000 (that was before the very recent significant increase in electricity charges). Those have very significant impacts in having a positive bottom line of income and expenses.
- 6. The cash flow expenses also do not include Mission Offering. The total contributions by church members for Missions was \$95,925. That was an increase of \$15,609 over 2023. That amount was paid to 21 recipient organizations. The five largest were Peace Dale Dinner Table \$40,400; ALS Support for Rebekah Lloyd \$10,648; Hope for Horizon Playground \$10,300; Tabitha's Closet \$9,959; and Haiti Sponsorships \$3,911.

July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025 Fiscal Budget: As a result of the approved By-Law changes the church has shifted to a fiscal year budget starting July 1, 2024. Approval is made in June.

- 1. Total income budgeted is \$395,375 (not including Missions offering). The anticipated primary revenue is expected from the same sources: \$263,000 from Current Contributions, \$70,000 from the UCC Trust, \$16,500 from the Fobes Trust, \$9,000 from the Bazaar.
- 2. Total expense budgeted \$393,296. These are basically the same areas as the previous year: \$234,620 for Salaries and Benefits; \$57,386 for Property Management; \$34,700 (a significant savings of about \$5,000 for cleaning services as a result of a contractual adjustment for the service) Insurance; \$17,440 for Office Expenses and \$14,650 for Music
- 3. Future items relative to finance to address in constructing the fiscal year annual budget are: increasing contributions from members and non-members; enhancing planned giving; stimulation of other fund-raising possibilities; assure we are obtaining the best yield on cash accounts; assess all insurance premium cost; assess structure of Fobes Trust; assess physical building needs and determine how to prioritize and pay for the needs.

Investments and Restricted and Unrestricted Funds:

- 1. The UCC Trust is our primary Endowment account. The total value as of 12/31/24 was \$1,340,354. We are still in the process of determining the flow of funds and return
- 2. The allocation of the Trust is 8% cash; 19% balanced; and 72% equity. The investment strategy is to maintain about two years of estimated withdrawal in the cash position; 3 years in the balanced position and 5+ years in the equity. This minimizes concern over volatility and allows for more positioned for equity growth.
- 3. The withdrawal amount is 6% of the year-end balance attributable to the Endowment (and not other restricted or non-restricted funds). That value on 12/31/24 was \$1,152,000. The associated withdrawal amount will be \$69,498 for the current fiscal year 2024-2025.
- 4. There are 14 standing designated fund accounts held within the Endowment. The largest of these are the General Memorial Fund (\$49,359); Margaret Thompson Youth Fund (\$22,799); Maintenance Reserve Fund (\$20,079); Bruce Reynolds Music Fund (\$19,331); Youth Program Fund (\$13,731); Music Memorial Fund (\$11,157); and Solar Contingency Expense Fund (\$13,411). This does not include the many Mission funds. See the Balance Sheet at the end of the annual report.
- 5. The Fobes Fund is a restricted Endowment. This is a long-standing fund which continually pays about \$17,000 annually to the church. We do not have access to any assets or control over the management.

 Soil for Climate Change Mitigation, and a Rain Barrel Initiative. We also emphasized practical ways
 to live green, such as Reducing Plastic Waste and Banking with Integrity.
- Partnerships and Awareness: Through events like the Wild Harmony Farm tour and collaborations with organizations like Interfaith Power & Light, we deepened connections between faith and environmental stewardship.

Looking Ahead: 2025 and Beyond

The year ahead offers exciting opportunities for further growth and impact:

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

While organizing my digital church documents and other records late last winter, I came across the dedication of the Archive Room to Helen Jones in 2016. I read the following from 2 Peter 1:15: "And I will make every effort so that after my departure, you may be able at any time to recall these things." As I reflected on the year ahead, I thought about what my effort would look like in protecting the Church's rich history. How would I ensure that our Confirmands from the last 20 years, including my own daughter, would remember the humble beginnings of our Church? How could I give them the ability to fully understand how our long history evolved into a light that shines so bright that it spills out into the community, filling the dark holes left by other organizations. With a list of tasks that grew by the day, a plan began to take shape; one that would make our Church history more accessible, while preserving as many records as possible in a digital format and loading them online.

Fast forward to early Spring, and a request from Deacons sent me into the Archive Room in search of a document - and the opportunity to complete the first task on my lengthy list: Taking photographs of the layout of the Archive Room, from floor to ceiling. Now armed with dozens of images, I began creating a Google Drive file system, methodically building a digital home for the Church's historical documents. Another task is always ongoing: the collection of all data about PDCC that lives online, from records at the Rhode Island Historical Preservation Society to news outlet press releases. While doing some research online for inquiries about building details, I stumbled across an interesting article published by ARCHIPEDIA. The article takes a deep-dive into the interior design of the Church, noting the influences of Rowland Hazard's Quaker upbringing and La Farge's work in the apse and nave to the overall design of the Church. The record was dutifully added to our new, digital Archive.

As Pumpkins for a Purpose came to a close and preparation for the holidays began, more pictures were taken, shelves and file drawers were organized, and a spreadsheet slowly filled with items from the Archive Room, derived from the many images now stored online. I entered the Archive Room one last time in late 2024, organizing some of Church's oldest documents and taking dozens more pictures. This visit set the stage for my last discovery of the year, and across the room from where I began this project, with flowers blooming and the promise of summer just around the corner. Now, as I listened to the cold winter wind blow outside, I laid my hands for the first time on the handwritten journals of Rowland Hazard II. As I read his first entry dated January 30th, 1857, I began to think of a way that our Church and the community could continue to remember and give thanks for that cold winter day when Rowland Hazard II gathered his peers in prayer. Welcome to Foundation Day.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee began working on the 2025 Officer and Board nominations in October of 2024. The committee included Sue Blackerby, Renee LaMontagne, Vivan Skipper, Meg Kolodziej and Joanne Haynes, chair. Each committee member was assigned as liaison to different boards and contacted the boards to discuss member participation, potential new members, chair/co-chair positions, projects, goals and any needs or concerns. We determined that there were 17 vacancies for 2025, including officers, board members, and delegates.

We found that there were many eager board members willing to continue on boards on which they were serving. We were also able to recruit new members and active friends to serve in various capacities on the boards. We are blessed to have a number of active members on boards who are very active when they are here, but they also enjoy the warmth of the sun for a few months during winter or in the summer. In the case of those boards where we have a number of snowbirds or beach-lovers, we have increased the

membership on the board to assure the boards can continue to operate fully during all the months of the year.

We are happy to report that all vacancies on boards and officer positions have been filled and that chairs and/or co-chairs have been identified for each board. We encourage the boards to operate with their elected members primarily responsible for planning their program and activities and to use ad hoc (action groups) of volunteers to work on specific tasks or events throughout the year. This will address the often-heard complaint that people want to be "doing", not attending meetings. We feel this new approach will address this concern and allow more people to participate in a variety of ways. Ad hoc groups for each board have been set up in Breeze to facilitate communication with people in these groups and to easily add more people as they are interested.

The proposed slate of nominees (in Bold Italics) is combined with the existing Board members and has been posted 2 weeks prior to the Annual Meeting as required by the By-laws. A huge thank you to everyone who has volunteered their time and talents in service to Peace Dale Congregational Church. A special thanks to the nominating committee members for their dedication to this task.

PEACE DALE DINNER TABLE

On February 19, 2025, the Peace Dale Dinner Table will celebrate its 11th anniversary of operation. Thanks to the phenomenal gifts of time, talent and treasure so generously bestowed by the Peace Dale Congregational Church, the Dinner Table serves close to 250 take out meals every Wednesday to those in our community dealing with food insecurity. In addition, the Dinner Table also provides a dine-in opportunity each Tuesday for those who would enjoy a meal and the company of others. Finally, the church continues to serve as the home of the "Kitchen of Hope," which serves 300 take out meals each Friday and further supports our neighbors in need.

Since our start in 2014, food insecurity has grown, not subsided as we had all hoped when this mission began. As a result of the RIBridges data breach, there are now more folks unable to access benefits that would help them put food on the table. Our mission to provide food to children and their families, the alone and the hungry continues.

The members of PDCC congregation and the community have been most generous. The church has overwhelmingly supported this mission financially; others supporting the Dinner Table financially include the Rotary Club, the Narragansett Lions, the Greater Women's Federation of South County and Tabitha's Closet.

We have about 150 volunteers, as well as support from students at the Middlebridge School and the Greater Women's Federation of South County who cook the second week of every month. Our youngest volunteer is 11, our oldest is 85. There are over 170 volunteers. We are also a known spot for high school students seeking community service credit hours for National Honor Society, Confirmation, and other organizations. Community service hours are also needed for young drivers caught speeding or others that are so ordered by the court. We have met the greatest people!

For so many of our Dinner Table volunteers, volunteering not only provides a sense of purpose, but also the knowledge that we in an Ecumenical spirit are working to create Shalom and justice for all as we work to provide nutritious meals to children and their families, the alone and the hungry.

HISTORY OF PEACE DALE DINNER TABLE

Since February 19, 2014, the Peace Dale Dinner Table has been serving weekly meals every Wednesday to children and their families, the alone and the hungry. Meals are designed to include a protein, starch, vegetable and dessert. Inspirational messages and prayers are sometimes included with meals, as well as other gift items to entertain or comfort our guests.

From 2014 to the time of the COVID shutdown in 2020, meals were served in Fellowship Hall of Peace Dale Church. The Peace Dale Dinner Table was an outgrowth of the Westerly Supper Table which was organized in 2010.

At the PDDT our guests sat at large round tables covered with green checkered tablecloths, set with silverware and dishes. Food was served by an intergenerational group of volunteers and bussers removed plates and silverware. A wonderful sense of community formed among many of our guests and with our volunteers. The Dinner Table became a regular Wednesday night spot for our 70-90 guests per week.

From April to August 2020 (during COVID), the Dinner Table ceased operations. We watched what restaurants were doing with take-out meals, and in September re-opened as a reservation-only take-out/home delivery venue. Our numbers grew

In 2020, the Dinner Table/Peace Dale Church began a collaboration with members of St. Francis of Assisi (now the Kitchen of Hope) who continue to serve meals from PDCC on Fridays. The Dinner Table not only nourishes those for whom we serve and deliver meals but feeds the souls of those who support this mission financially and volunteer.

RAISERIGHT GIFT CARD PROGRAM

The RaiseRight program is a fundraising model where retailers agree to sell gift cards to non-profits at a discount from the face value of a gift card. The buyer gets the full-valued gift card, and the church gets a rebate (anywhere from 1.5% to 20%).

Thanks also to our partnership with the Jonnycake Center of Hope (Kate Brewster and Alicia Monnes) who provided over 10% of our sales this year by using RaiseRight to provide gift cards for their clients. We also partnered with the Board of Missions to encourage the congregation to buy gift cards for the Jonnycake Angel Tree from RaiseRight and Tabitha's Closet in giving some of their earnings to Jonnycake Center of Hope through gift cards. The RaiseRight program generated over \$6,500 of revenue for the church.

TABITHA'S CLOSET

When the Jonnycake Center determined that it could no longer support a used clothing program, PDCC'S Missions Board saw an outreach opportunity. Tabitha's Closet was thus created with 3 objectives in mind:

- Develop a "pay what you can" model for providing high quality and affordable used clothing for those with limited means:
- Support church and community outreach programs with proceeds from sales;
- Promote environmental stewardship by keeping clothing and shoes out of landfills.

Having just completed its first full year, Tabitha's Closet is delighted to report that we are achieving our objectives, and Tabitha's has become an outstanding outreach program for the church. In 2024, we provided over \$11,000 in funds, supporting church and community programs as directed by the Missions Board. In-house outreach programs benefitting from our sales include the Dinner Table, the Bistro, and the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

Led by Suzanne Faucher, who organized and continues to manage the operation, our team now numbers over 30 volunteers. We sort the clothing donations weekly on Tuesday and Friday afternoons and then manage the store on Saturday mornings. Soon, we will begin a once-a-week nighttime opening, when the Bistro is open on Tuesdays.

The Closet is located next to the Sandcastles Nursery School downstairs in the Christian Education wing. Haven't participated? We WELCOME ALL to participate through volunteering (let the office know and we'll contact you), shopping on Saturday mornings, AND helping by donating your gently used, clean, and new clothing to the Closet. Our collection bins are located just down the stairs from the office.

Aleda Skiffington continues as our technology intern and is the primary person running the sound on Sunday mornings and for other events. We added Anthony Burdick to our roster of Technology interns and he is learning the systems and providing a back-up when Aleda is not available. Both have assisted with the technology needs for special events as well as Sunday morning worship.

A complete Inventory of all of our audio-visual equipment throughout the church was conducted in September. A comprehensive listing of all the many cables, screens, microphones, cameras, projectors and much more is compiled on a spreadsheet with their location and replacement value. This should be a valuable tool for future reference.

Worship service recording using our existing Mevo cameras was explored by Darlene Hermes and Don Richer. The goal is to record the service and post it to our church's You-tube channel so that people who are unable to attend worship can stay connected by watching the service on-line. They made great progress but have paused the effort while a work-around for the firewall of our WiFi system can be created for this purpose. Enid Watson has donated an I-pad for this system and Darlene a lap-top computer. Thank you both for your generous gifts.

Worship slides are faithfully created each week for worship by Don Lowell and Joanne Haynes. Slide operators include James McMonigle, Jet Vertz, Eric Carlson and Ray Dufault. Thanks to all for their very important contributions to our worship.

With a few challenges along the way, the use of technology has now become an integral part of our communication and presentation at PDCC which has enhanced our mission and ministry. There is always more to be done and additional people to help in this area are always welcome.
